

BAPTISM: Baptisms are scheduled once a month on Sunday afternoons except during Lent. Expectant parents are asked to contact the rectory to schedule an appointment at least three months before the desired date of Baptism. Parents must attend a special catechetical session prior to the Baptism.

MARRIAGE: Couples should contact the rectory one year in advance of the proposed wedding date in order to allow for the proper pre-marital preparation. At least one person must be a registered parishioner of Holy Family.

ANointing of the Sick: This is a sacrament not only for those who are at the point of death. As soon as anyone begins to be in danger of death from sickness or old age, we encourage you to call for a priest in the rectory.

Ministry of the Sick: The Eucharist will be brought to the homebound. Please contact the Rectory with the names and addresses of parishioners who are ill or homebound.

Vocation: Women and men who feel called to the religious life, and men called to Holy Orders, should contact the Vocations Office at 973-497-4365.

From the Pastors Desk

Today as we celebrate Father's Day, we give thanks and honor to God for the gift of our fathers who have nurtured us in many ways. There are so many different names we have to address our fathers: Father, Dad, Daddy, Dada, Papa, Pop, the list goes on as we add other languages into the picture.

Today's Gospel passage connects very beautifully as it, indirectly, refers to names as Jesus asks His disciples, "Who do you say that I am?" We might ask ourselves *what is in a name*. It is more than we sometimes realize. We know how embarrassing it can be when we forget someone's name. We try in various ways to disguise our predicament. The most common way is a big *hello* or *hi* in a cheerful way, hoping that our smile might cover up our memory loss. Names reveal our identity. When we share our name with someone, we are admitting that person into our own world and agreeing to a certain level of familiarity.

Names, particularly first names in western culture, do not merely identify us. They carry power. You might think about what it feels like to hear your name spoken by someone you love. Your spirits soar and your heart might beat faster. Parents know only too well the effect of using a child's full name when they want their attention. There is a world of difference between calling out *Danny, Dan* or *Daniel*, and the tone of voice behind it.

We read how Jesus had been teaching His disciples by both His words and deeds. He wants to know how much they have understood Him. After prayer, He asks a question about His own identity: "Who do the crowds say that I am?" There are a variety of answers by His disciples but it is Peter who answered with the most accurate response. Peter said: "He is the one who is awaited, the Christ of God, the Messiah." Jesus asked His disciples not to make the truth known. We might ask ourselves why that is. It is because what the people expected of the title and what Jesus meant by the title, was very different. The people were expecting a king who would bring in the reign of God. Using the title He prefers when He speaks of His mission, Jesus goes on to say that the Son of Man will not be a military warrior. Instead He will suffer, be rejected and be put to death, but He will rise again on the third day. The title, *Son of Man*, implies the sense of one who brings together and symbolizes the people; through it, Jesus is able to take His disciples understanding to another level. Those who follow Him will have to accept a similar pattern of suffering. What is asked of Jesus will also be asked of His disciples.

My brothers and sisters, as we reflect on this, just as Jesus explored the question of His own identity and through His life and death, so do we. It is answered in how we live out each moment until that instant of death when we join ourselves to Christ completely. During this Year of Mercy, let us reflect on how we share our mercy and compassion towards others.

On behalf of Fr. Mauro, Fr. Francesco and I, thank you to Emma and Michele Tarantino for all their hard work in keeping traditions and making the Tredicina Novena in honor of St. Anthony such a success. I also extend a special thank you to Sr. Romilda and Gina Tamburri for their constant dedication. We had great attendance and it is beautiful to keep these traditions alive.

Another special thank you to our Director of Religious Education, Sr. Ella Mae, and to Sr. Eileen, the catechists and all the volunteers who helped make our Confirmation celebration so beautiful. God bless all of you.

School vacations have started; as you begin taking time off and relaxing, please be safe and remember to keep up with your weekly offertory.



The Archdiocese Reports all Allegations of Abuse

The Archdiocese of Newark takes very seriously any and all complaints of sexual misconduct by members of the clergy, Religious and lay staff of the Archdiocese. We encourage anyone with knowledge of an act of sexual misconduct to inform the Archdiocese immediately so that we may take appropriate action to protect others and provide support to victims of sexual abuse.

Although we will report all allegations of abuse immediately to the appropriate County Prosecutor, we encourage anyone with an allegation of abuse also to reach out to the Prosecutor.

Individuals who report an allegation of sexual misconduct may do so by calling the Victim's Assistance Coordinator of the Archdiocesan Office of Child and Youth Protection at (201) 407-3256.

The "Differences" Between the Baby in the Womb and the Newborn Baby

There are four "differences" between the baby in the mother's womb (or so-called fetus) who has no protection under the law from a newborn baby, who is protected:

1. **Size** The baby in the womb is usually smaller than newborns. The question, then, is what does size have to do with rights of personhood? The answer: nothing.
2. **Level of Development** Babies in the womb are less developed than a newborn (unless the newborn is born prematurely). Again this has no moral significance. Children are generally less developed than adults and all human beings continue to develop and change throughout our entire lives. It is humanity, not brain capacity or strength that determines personhood.
3. **Location** The baby in the womb has a different place of residence. Again this is irrelevant because personhood stems from being a human being, not from your location.
4. **Dependency** Abortion protagonists love to argue that, "since a fetus cannot survive on its own, it has no inherent right to life." The problem with this argument is that to varying degrees, we are all dependent on others. Moreover, newborn babies and small children are absolutely dependent upon their parents for survival. What is absurd about this line of thinking is the fact that dependency should merit more protection under the law, not less! We are all far more outraged, for example, at violence towards children than at violence towards other adults. The reason is obvious. Children are more helpless and innocent and less capable of defending themselves than adults. The child in the mother's womb is the most helpless and innocent and the least capable of defending themselves.

That is precisely why we must fight to protect them!

Every person is part of God's plan.
