






**MARRIAGE:** Couples should contact the rectory one year in advance of the proposed wedding date in order to allow for the proper pre-marital preparation. At least one person must be a registered parishioner of Holy Family.

**ANOINTING OF THE SICK:** This is a sacrament not only for those who are at the point of death. As soon as anyone begins to be in danger of death from sickness or old age, we encourage you to call for a priest in the rectory.

**MINISTRY OF THE SICK:** The Eucharist will be brought to the homebound. Please contact the Rectory with the names and addresses of parishioners who are ill or homebound.

**VOCATION:** Women and men who feel called to the religious life, and men called to Holy Orders, should contact the Vocations Office at 973-497-4365.

**2<sup>nd</sup> Sunday in Ordinary Time B-2018**

My brothers and sisters in the Lord!

It is hard to believe that we are already out of the Christmas Season and, once again, in the Calendar Year of Ordinary Time in the Church. I would like to thank all those who helped in un-decorating the Church from the Christmas celebration. It is a very tedious task of getting everything back into storage and just cleaning up. I am truly grateful to all who helped with this work. May God always bless you abundantly, especially as we begin this New Year.



Today's readings give us two vocation stories. The first concerns a young boy named Samuel who lived in the ancient temple at Shiloh. One night he heard a voice calling his name. Assuming it was the old priest Eli, he went to him, only to be told to go back to bed because he certainly had not called him. The same thing happened two more times. Then Eli realized it was God who was doing the calling. He advised young Samuel that if he heard the voice again he should respond, "Speak, Lord, your servant is listening." Samuel did as he was told and the outcome was that "he grew up and the Lord was with him and let no word of his fall to the ground." It seemed that Samuel continued listening to God's Word and was always ready to follow it. He became a great leader of God's people.

The second vocation story is in the Gospel and it concerns two of John the Baptist's disciples. One day as Jesus passed by, John said to the disciples, "Look, there is the Lamb of God." As the disciples then began following Jesus, He turned and asked, "What do you want?" They may have been taken by surprise, and so they answered rather vaguely, "Rabbi, where do you live?" But in John's Gospel, words like *live*, *stay* or  *dwell* often have a deeper meaning; they are really asking *where do we meet you, where do we encounter you, how do we get to know you?* Jesus gave a very simple response, "Come and see." They respond to His invitation and they stay with Him all that day; they became His friends for life.

My brothers and sisters, God has a call for everyone; it is a call to holiness, to intimate friendship, and that vocation is fulfilled principally in the living out of our daily life and the various vocations it involves. Like young Samuel who prayed, "Speak Lord, your servant is listening," we are called to have a listening ear or, better, a listening heart, a heart open enough and alert enough to hear God's words and respond to them. We listen to God's word not only at Mass or when we read the Scriptures, but also when God speaks to us, softly and gently, through the people we meet, the events that make up our lives, or the inspirations that come to our minds and hearts.

There is sound advice for us behind the question Jesus put to the two disciples-to-be. "*What do you want?*" He asked them. It's a question He always put to those who wanted to be His friends. The answer He is looking for is not some smart, flippant reply, like *winning the lottery* but an absolutely serious one, an answer on which we pin our lives. And the answer is not for God's benefit but rather for ours. It shows where our priorities lie in relation to God, to other people and to the world around us. Perhaps in a moment of silence while at Mass, we might hear the Lord asking us, "*What do you want, really want above all else?*" If, in our stumbling way, we can reply, "*I want you. I want to be your friend. Where do you live?*" He will then answer, as He answered those first friends of His: "Come and see." Come and you will see for yourself that you have answered the most wonderful calling of all.

#### **The Courage to Speak and to Act Against Abortion**

The mother's womb should be the very safest place for a child. Tragically, it has become the most dangerous location - more dangerous than any battlefield or terrorist target. In some cities, about 40 percent of pregnancies end in abortion.

To defend these innocent children and to speak and act on their behalf takes courage. Perhaps family and friends may not like our pro-life stance. Perhaps we may lose business. We all know people who have had an abortion so perhaps we do not want to offend a relative or loved one. It is all too easy to make excuses or make calculations in our minds and hearts, which often results in paralyzed inaction and apathy.

We are always told of reasons why we cannot speak up against abortion. If the priest speaks in Church, he will be rebuked by some who will try to argue it's too political; if we speak in the political arena, we are told it's too religious. If we speak in the media, we are told it's too disturbing; in our schools and colleges, it's too disruptive. On the public streets, it's too distressing for children; in the business world it's too 'controversial, in the family it's too divisive, and in social settings, it's too impolite or politically incorrect.

So, if abortion is plainly wrong and inhumane (which it most definitely is), how do we do what is right and where do we go to say so? The unambiguous answer is that we must stop looking for a risk-free place to fight abortion, and have the courage to speak up in all these arenas!

Let's stop counting the cost to ourselves if we speak up and start counting the cost to the innocent children, if we remain silent.

**TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION**




“Ordinary Time” began for us this week. On the old calendar, the feast of the Presentation, still more than two weeks away, was the last day of the Christmas season. Sadly, Bethlehem is hardly a place of peace on earth these days. The ancient Christian community has been largely uprooted by political strife. The Church of the Nativity stands (barely) in remarkable disrepair and disorder in Manger Square. The roof is crumbling, the major doorways are blocked, the wiring is faulty, and the worship life is disrupted by quarrels among Eastern Christians.

The church was founded by the Emperor Constantine in 325, destroyed in a Samaritan revolt in 539, and rebuilt by the Emperor Justinian. When the area came under Muslim control in 638, the holiness of the church was respected, and in return Christians allowed Muslims to pray in the south aisle, a right still upheld. Earlier in that century, invading Persians were ordered to destroy all churches, but when they saw the magi carved over the doorway of the Church of the Nativity, they spared it out of respect for their ancestors who bore gold, frankincense, and myrrh to the same city. The Crusaders restored and redecored the church by the twelfth century, and it is their plan that survives. Down a few stone steps is a stone grotto with a silver star marking the place of Christ’s birth: when the star was stolen in 1847 it triggered an international crisis that exploded into the Crimean War.

Since 1852, the church has been shared by the Roman Catholic, Greek Orthodox, and Armenian Churches. The Greeks are in charge of the grotto, but don’t enjoy the best of friendships with the Armenians. Catholics have the care of the Chapel of the Manger, and avoid the squabbles by a separate entrance to the Franciscan monastery church of St. Catherine. Pray for peace in Bethlehem!
