



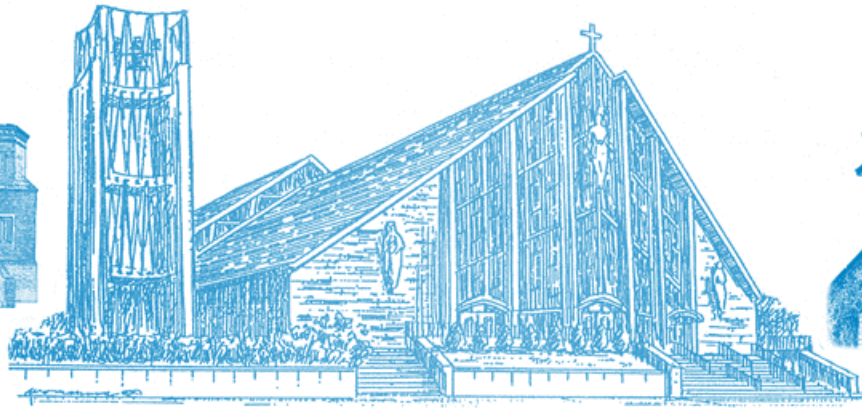

MARRIAGE: Couples should contact the rectory one year in advance of the proposed wedding date in order to allow for the proper pre-marital preparation. At least one person must be a registered parishioner of Holy Family.

ANOINTING OF THE SICK: This is a sacrament not only for those who are at the point of death. As soon as anyone begins to be in danger of death from sickness or old age, we encourage you to call for a priest in the rectory.

MINISTRY OF THE SICK: The Eucharist will be brought to the homebound. Please contact the Rectory with the names and addresses of parishioners who are ill or homebound.

My brothers and sisters in the Lord!

Today's Gospel passage is a story of role-reversal. St. Mark's version shows signs of being out of place in its context. In last Sunday's Gospel, Jesus was surrounded by His disciples and healed many sick people. When He tried to find space and rest for Himself, His disciples managed to track Him down. As today's passage opens, Jesus is alone in an unknown town, and

the story heightens the tension and gets off to a bad start. Under the law, a leper was forbidden to approach anyone, yet one has the courage to approach Jesus. Perhaps he thinks that he has nothing to lose; because of his situation, he is already good as dead, a non-person, cut off from human contact. We see how he approaches Jesus, drops to his knees, and says: "If you want, you can cure me." Jesus does the unthinkable and says: "Of course I want to! Be cured!" St. Mark states that Jesus felt sorry for him or, in the Greek translation, that he felt great compassion for the leper.

As we continue in the story, we see that many things happen. First, the man is made clean and declared free from leprosy. Jesus tells him to go and show himself to the priest and make the offering prescribed by Moses as evidence of his recovery. Jesus then tells the man not to say anything about this to anyone but we see that just as the visible testimony of his cure was evident, so now is the verbal acknowledgements of Jesus' power a testimony of God's work. The man, recently cut off from all human contact, is now publically holding court at the heart of the community from where he was once excluded. Jesus, however, now has to stay outside the town where there are no others. The one who was cleansed, the leper, takes the place of the one who had cleansed him. And there is the role-reversal.

This miracle is about one person but it is a universal application. When Jesus cleansed the leper and took on his condition, we have a sign of what happened to humanity when the Son of God came into the human world. In the beautifully poetic creation story, God creates humanity in His own image and likeness. In today's Gospel we have a further expansion on this idea. Jesus takes on the isolated condition of the former leper who is restored to fuller humanity.

On the cross, full role-reversal takes place. Jesus pays the penalty for all sin: He exchanges places with us by dying for us. We become fully human by Jesus' death because He destroyed what makes us less human. Here's the question this story poses for us: If the totally innocent Jesus took on the entire burden of our sin in His outreach to us, can we ever excuse failing to reach out to a brother or sister who is dehumanized by exclusion, persecution, or marginalization? The answer, of course, is that we cannot. We might ask ourselves who the equivalent of lepers is in our community and how we can reach out to them.

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION



Today's Gospel centers on the plight of a leper and Jesus' response of healing. In Hawaii, the bacterium that causes leprosy probably entered from China in the mid-1800s, and the native islanders were susceptible to the dreaded disease. In 1866, the government literally dumped the sufferers on a remote and virtually inaccessible island peninsula with towering cliffs. Thrown off ships into the sea, the sick people were told to swim for the beach and head for caves, and for seven years the only supplies were similarly cast into the sea to drift ashore. It was then, 1873, that a thirty-three-year-old Belgian priest, Damien de Veuster, went voluntarily to Kalaupapa. Before long, he cajoled the government into funding his mission and its hospital, built a village with proper homes and sanitation, and recruited Mother Marianne Cope to bring sisters from Syracuse, New York, to nurse the sick. Damien, who eventually died of leprosy, has been canonized, and Mother Marianne as well.

Although leprosy has been curable since the 1940s, today a few patients remain in their lifelong home, now a national historic site. The peninsula is still utterly isolated from the outside world, and the speed limit for the few cars there is 5 mph since there's nowhere to go! The hospital is still well-staffed and equipped, but access is regulated and visitors must take an official tour, often involving a descent down the cliffs by "Molakai mule." There are few places on earth that evoke the healing power of Jesus, or our call to follow the Healer, more than Damien's beloved island mission.

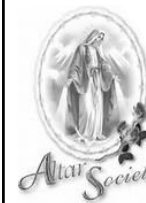
Our next meeting is Monday, February 26, 7:00 PM, in the St. Joseph's Center.

ARCHDIOCESE OF NEWARK - 2018 LENTEN REGULATIONS

1. The days of both Fast and Abstinence during Lent are Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. If possible, the fast on Good Friday is continued until the Easter Vigil (or Holy Saturday night) as the “paschal fast” to honor the suffering and death of the Lord Jesus, and to prepare ourselves to share more fully and to celebrate more readily His Resurrection. The other Fridays of Lent are days of Abstinence.

On a day of Fast, only one (1) full meal is permitted, **and two (2) smaller meals, which, if added together, would not exceed the main meal in quantity.**

Those between the ages of 18 and 59 are obliged to fast.

On a day of Abstinence, no meat may be eaten. Those who have reached the age of 14 are obliged by the law of abstinence.

2. The obligation to observe the laws of Fast and Abstinence “substantially,” or as a whole, is a serious obligation.

3. The Fridays of the year, outside of Lent, are designated as days of penance, but each individual may substitute for the traditional abstinence from meat some other practice of voluntary self-denial as penance.

4. The time for fulfilling the Paschal Precept (Easter Duty*) extends from the **First Sunday of Lent, February 18 2018, to the Solemnity of the Holy Trinity, May 27, 2018.**

***Canon 920, §1.** *All the faithful, after they have been initiated into the Most Holy Eucharist, are bound by the obligation of receiving Communion at least once a year*


